


We know that on occasions your child may need to attend an appointment during the school day, however your child should attend school before and after the appointment where possible.

Why marine animals can't stop eating plastic?

Plastic doesn't just look like food, it smells, feels and even sounds like food. In an interview about Blue Planet II, David Attenborough describes a sequence in which an albatross arrives at its nest to feed its young. "And what comes out of the mouth?" he says. "Not fish, and not squid — which is what they mostly eat but plastic."

It is, as Attenborough says, heart breaking. It's also strange. Albatrosses forage over thousands of kilometres in search of their preferred prey, which they pluck from the water with ease. How can such capable birds be so easily fooled, and come back from their long voyages with nothing but a mouthful of plastic?

It's small comfort to discover that albatrosses are not alone. At least 180 species of marine animals have been documented consuming plastic, from tiny plankton to gigantic whales. Plastic has been found inside the guts of a third of UK-caught fish, as reported by Science Direct, and this includes species that we regularly consume as food. It has also been found in other mealtime favourites like mussels and lobsters. In short, animals of all shapes and sizes are eating plastic, and with 12.7 million tons of the stuff entering the oceans every year, there's plenty to go around.

One explanation is that animals simply mistake plastic for familiar food items — plastic pellets, for example, are thought to resemble tasty fish eggs. But as humans we are biased by our own senses. To appreciate animals' love of plastic, scientists must try to view the world as they do.

Humans are visual creatures, but when foraging, many marine animals, including albatrosses rely primarily on their sense of smell. Savoca and his colleagues have conducted experiments suggesting that some species of seabirds and fish are attracted to plastic by its odour. Specifically, they implicated dimethyl sulfide (DMS), a compound known to attract foraging birds, as the chemical cue emanating from plastic. Essentially, algae grows on floating plastic, and when that algae is eaten by krill — a major marine food source — it releases DMS, attracting birds and fish that then munch on the plastic instead of the krill they came for.

That murmured whisper we heard a couple of weeks ago is starting to develop into an audible chant...It's Coming Home!



Online Safety


As part of our continued drive to offer advice and support for all aspects of digital/online safety, we are going to showcase weekly information from the National Online Safety resources which can be found at:

The latest digital trend growing in popularity for our children are apps on their phone or tablet that look like one thing but are secretly hiding another purpose. They fixrst became particularly popular in 2016. However, children are becoming more and more familiar with 'secret' photo hiding apps, where an app which looks relatively ordinary is actually a hidden gateway to private photos and videos. These apps allow their users to hide images, videos and notes within the app which is also passcode protected. One of the most common types of hidden app used is a 'fake calculator' app however many others are also available.

COVID-19 in Redbridge

Dear Parents/Carers,

We've asked schools to pass this letter on to you as it contains important information about COVID-19 in the borough.

Numbers of people with COVID-19 are on the increase

In common with most of the country cases of COVID-19 in Redbridge are on the rise, driven by the "delta" variant. The age-groups most affected are the young, particularly because they are not eligible to be vaccinated and so lack the increased protection against the virus that vaccination brings. It remains as important as ever to stick to the rules around social distancing, remembering the focus on "hands, space, face, fresh air".

How to get vaccinated

We are working closely with the NHS to give people opportunities to get vaccinated locally, as this provides the best chance of protecting ourselves, our families and the wider community against the virus and enabling life to get back to normal.

We have vaccination clinics at Redbridge Town Hall with a walk-in slot. Residents and their family members aged 18 years or older can get their Pfizer vaccine at these clinics. If your older relatives haven't had their vaccination, please invite them to come with you.

Appointments: 4pm to 7pm - call free phone line 0800 038 59 29 to book

Walk-ins: 7.30pm to 8.30pm. No proof of address, immigration status or NHS number is required for the walk-ins - just confirmation of your age

We also have pop-up vaccination clinics in the borough. Residents and their family members aged 18 years or older can get their vaccines at these pop-up clinics.

There will be limited availability at these clinics and residents are advised to book an appointment via the number above.

Attendance at sports days and other school events

Schools have worked tirelessly to minimise the risk of transmission of the virus on their premises over the last year and longer. They all have in place risk assessments designed to do this and are required to follow the government's guidance in how they operate. That guidance means that schools cannot permit groups of more than 30 adults to be present on the school premises. On that basis we have advised headteachers that whilst school sports days can take place this term parents unfortunately should not be allowed to attend. We know some of you will be disappointed but hope you will understand that we need all to do our bit to reduce the risk of the virus being transmitted.

Google Classrooms - Help Sheet

What is Google Classroom?



Google Classroom is a class-organisation platform that incorporates Google's core G Suite (Google Docs, Sheets, Slides, Drive) and other Google products so students can access everything they need for a class, including homework assignments, group projects and files. Google Classroom is designed for organisation and collaboration. We will be using Google Classroom to assign homework as well as within school to improve children's digital literacy.


How do you log into a Google Classroom?

Your child has been given a username (email address) and a password, these should be stuck inside their communication or homework books. You have also received an email and/or text with the information. To access it you can search 'Google login', once you have logged in using the username and password you have access to email, classroom and Google drive (a storage system that uses the Google version of Word, Excel and PowerPoint).

When you log in look for the 'waffle' (the nine dots).



You will then see these options and you select 'Classroom'



Each class is private to the people the teacher has personally invited, including the students enrolled in that class and other teachers. Once your child has accessed a class, they can use all the features the teacher has enabled for that class, including class schedules, assignments and announcements.

Can you use Google Classroom at home?

Children can access Google Classroom from anywhere, including from their phones or tablets, when they download the Google Classroom app.

How does my child find out about new stuff posted in Google Classroom?

Your child will receive an email when the teacher posts an announcement. These emails come through your child's email account, not in Classroom. Classroom doesn't alert you when an assignment is due; to keep track of deadlines, kids need to check the class calendar.
