

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Dear Parents and Carers,

It was lovely to welcome visitors to SSPP this week. On Monday, Mrs Shepherd, a link adviser from the Diocese of Brentwood, enjoyed hearing about the teaching of RE across the school, looking at books and joining in with prayers in Reception. On Tuesday the children shared their Geography learning with

Mr Loukes, a consultant from Herts for Learning, he was impressed with the children's knowledge and how polite and well behaved they were. Y4 participated in necessary pedestrian training on Tuesday; let's hope they use these skills wisely when out and about. We thank 6R and Mr Roca-Mas for the lovely assembly last week, on the theme of being 'Stronger Together' what an excellent message for the start of the year at SSPP. It was good to see many parents in attendance, it is beginning to feel like 'normal' once more.

May I bring your attention to Google Classroom; most of our communication with parents and carers will occur through this platform. It is important you, as parents and carers, login regularly, using your child's login details, in order to keep up to date with events and information. We have recently posted information regarding the updated Relationship and Sex Education policy and the 'Journey in Love' scheme, it is very important you read this letter. A great deal of information has also been posted regarding the after school club provision at SSPP. Most of these clubs are free to children as they are run by members of staff. The uptake has been slightly disappointing for clubs such as football, netball and choir; if your child is interested, please complete the appropriate form on Goggle Classroom, or contact Mrs Woodhouse on clubs@sspeterandpauls.redbridge.sch.uk.

Children must be collected from the playground at the end of the day, where a member of staff will hand over the child to a designated adult. The school will not release any child, to walk unsupervised to the school gates or offsite, to meet parents.

It was a pleasure to celebrate World Mental Health Day this morning, with the 'Time to Talk' coffee morning; thank you to the parents who attended. I hope the information shared by the well-being team was useful. This year SSPP will focus on being kind, which links nicely to our Jesuit virtues of being grateful and generous.

We have noticed that many parents are using their mobile phones, or wearing ear pods when collecting their child and talking to members of staff. Research studies show that children are competing with technology for their parents' attention and may feel unimportant, if they have to compete with smartphones for parents' attention. It is important that as adults, we model good manners and politeness to the children. May I remind you that the office staff are available to help you; please be patient, remove ear pods when talking to them and model those good manners!

We also had some fantastic entries for our poster competition. The winners will be announced during assembly next week.





















National Poetry Day

Online Safety

Hoop is a social networking app that syncs with Snapchat to help users build their community of friends. It works along similar principles to Tinder: swiping left or right will reject or accept potential contacts, making new connections in the process. When two users accept each other, they can then communicate via Snapchat. There is no chat function on Hoop itself: video and audio calls, messaging and image sharing all take place through Snapchat. When a user adds a new Hoop contact, they are essentially sharing their personal information from Snapchat.

In the guide, you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as grooming, visible location and no age verification system.

Google Classrooms - Help Sheet

What is Google Classroom?



Google Classroom is a class-organisation platform that incorporates Google's core G Suite (Google Docs, Sheets, Slides, Drive) and other Google products so students can access everything they need for a class, including homework assignments, group projects and files. Google Classroom is designed for organisation and collaboration. We will be using Google Classroom to assign homework as well as within school to improve children's digital literacy.


How do you log into a Google Classroom?

Your child has been given a username (email address) and a password, these should be stuck inside their communication or homework books. You have also received an email and/or text with the information. To access it you can search 'Google login', once you have logged in using the username and password you have access to email, classroom and Google drive (a storage system that uses the Google version of Word, Excel and PowerPoint).

When you log in look for the 'waffle' (the nine dots).



You will then see these options and you select 'Classroom'



Each class is private to the people the teacher has personally invited, including the students enrolled in that class and other teachers. Once your child has accessed a class, they can use all the features the teacher has enabled for that class, including class schedules, assignments and announcements.

Can you use Google Classroom at home?

Children can access Google Classroom from anywhere, including from their phones or tablets, when they download the Google Classroom app.

How does my child find out about new stuff posted in Google Classroom?

Your child will receive an email when the teacher posts an announcement. These emails come through your child's email account, not solely in the Classroom. Classrooms do not alert you when an assignment is due; to keep track of deadlines, kids need to check the class calendar.
